News from Kabwe

Family Pillars Vocational Skills Training Centre

Greetings,

My name is Mwiza Margaret Lesa, the Manager and Entrepreneurship tutor at Family Pillar Vocational and Skills Training Centre (FPVSTC) a sister institution to Family Future Community School (FFCS). Our Centre provides skills training in 7 courses which are Computer Studies, Bricklaying and Plastering, Electrical, Plumbing and Sheetmetal, Metal Fabrication, Carpentry and Joinery, and Designing, Cutting and Tailoring. All courses also include Entrepreneurship, Trade Mathematics, Technical Drawing and Communication Skills. We have a total staff of 10 though there is need for more academic and auxiliary staff. We currently have 70 students in the various courses who will complete their training this December.

We have been supported so much by Future Pillars and so hereby say many thanks to them and all those who support us by contributing either in kind or cash for the running of this institution.

Special honour and thanks go towards the life of our late beloved Dr Margaret McDermott who made it possible for us to actualize the FPVSTC vision, firstly by having the centre built in memory of her late husband using her personal funds, and then ensuring that the centre was furnished and equipped. She understood the vision of not just providing education and feeding for orphaned and vulnerable children at FFCS but equipping the child that has grown into a youth to have a sustainable skill to help them alleviate poverty in their lives. With this passion she continued ensuring that the centre had enough training materials. She was always encouraging and supportive making sure that challenges were overcome unless it was impractical. She encouraged me personally to stand strong and execute my duties well so that the vision and mission of the centre are achieved. Even towards the end of her life, she would call and ask how we were progressing and what challenges we were facing so that we could discuss solutions together. As FPVSTC we are much indebted to her for the work done so far and her presence from time to time. I salute how the late Dr Margaret has inspired Future Pillars, especially Rosemary and Peter, to have interest in the centre. This has given us hope and we have seen continuity. It has shown us how legends let their legacy be carried on.



Finally, I would like to thank all those reading this newsletter and being inspired to do great works. Running Skills Training is very expensive, I therefore invite you to contribute to the empowerment of these youths through Future Pillars, Thank you.

Trustee Trip to Kabwe

First impressions...

Emma Berry joined the second trustee visit to Kabwe in July...

Words can't really describe my experience visiting Kabwe in Zambia. I was already aware that Future Pillars did amazing work, but nothing could have prepared me for the sheer impact it has on so many children's lives. I learnt so much about the charity during my visit and helped out wherever I could whether that be through assisting teachers in the classrooms, helping at their annual sports day, doing presentations for the older Skills students and giving as much love and attention to every child as I possibly could. Despite all adversities these children clearly have hope that through the work that Future Pillars do they will be able to create a positive life for the future generations that will follow them.



A typical day in the life of the children looked a bit like this: They would arrive at school often hours before their lessons began to help clean or meet with their friends in the safety of the school grounds. They then started their timetable that offers everything from science to expressive arts and everything in between. All the children are then served their lunch, often their only meal of the day, of beans, cabbage and nshima by the loving cooks who Future Pillars also support (highlighting the complexity of the operation to run a school and feed hundreds of children!). The children then returned to lessons for the afternoon before heading back home. The days the children have are weirdly similar to that of school children in the UK. They have assembly once a week, they go to lessons, they have lunch and they play with their friends at break time. Their positivity almost makes it hard to comprehend the true hardship that they experience in their daily lives.

We had the opportunity to visit some of the children's homes in the local compounds and it really hit home the conditions that they live in. With often nothing more than a single room for the full family, one set of clothes that they often also wear for school and no electricity. School for these children is clearly more than just education, it's a safe place that helps give them hope that they can have a brighter future. Family Futures is an extension of their own family and it's often the reason they survive every single day!



My visit to Kabwe reminded me of how fortunate I am to live in the UK and to have everything I could ever need in life. Since returning I have a new gratitude for life and so much love for the people I met out there. I already know that I want to visit the school again and am keen to understand what else I can do to support the charity.

News from UK

Feed 5 Update

Since the last newsletter, there has been a considerable step forward in the 'mechanics' of letter-writing to complement the sponsorship side of Feed 5. Flare Kanyika, the FFCS teacher responsible for Feed 5, has developed a system. On receipt of letters from UK for a specific group, he arranges for those children to come into school on a Saturday morning, together with a family member, if they have one. They read their own or group letter and then sketch out their response. Then, in the following week(s), the children can get help in writing it up neatly.



Yes, right now we have hit a bit of a snag... with so little rain, all the water reservoirs are dangerously low, and so the supply of hydro-electric power has been severely cut. Currently, in Kabwe and across most of Zambia, the electricity goes off around 9.00 am and comes on again around 11.00 pm every day. Trying to operate a school in such circumstances is very challenging and, understandably, the production of word-processed letters to UK is having to wait.

We still have plenty of groups of 5 children waiting to be sponsored – the packs are ready to go. To sponsor a group of 5 children costs £20 a month and you can be sure that such a commitment will impact considerably on the children, all of whom have been identified as vulnerable, with many being single or even double-orphaned. Learning stands a chance with some food in the tummy. Pure Gems

Meet 2 very special people, Margaret and Alan Dymond, long-standing members of Blandford Methodist Church.

During their professional lives, Margaret was a Nursery Nurse and Alan was an Engineer, a role which took them and their children Andrea and Elizabeth to the town of Mufulira, in the Copperbelt Province of Zambia from 1973 until 1977. Margaret and Alan moved to Blandford 17 years ago, and have been tireless in their interest, encouragement and practical support for the work in Kabwe. They have collected items for inclusion on the container and encouraged many others to do the same. Alan spent many hours last winter in the freezing cold helping Barry chip chewing gum off the bottom of 35 classroom desks, and they secured the gift of some double-glazed window units from a local council building about to be renovated. They have also drawn their daughters into donating and Andrea has enlisted the help of friends to give items of clothing and shoes – recently, nigh on 200 pairs of children's pants!! Alan and Margaret support the monthly Colehill Lunch and are now Feed 5 sponsors, involving their grandson, Jonathan, to write to the 5 children in Kabwe.



Blandford Methodist Church has also been generous in its support for Future Pillars, including the donation of all proceeds from the last 2 Harvest lunches. Margaret and Alan have played key roles in facilitating these events. 'Tireless' is an appropriate description of this couple and all that they do for the children in Zambia energises others back here in UK, not least us. We are very grateful to them. Yes, the Dymonds are pure gems!

Container 4 Kabwe

After the drama of Container 3 arriving at FFCS in June just as we were about to leave Zambia, we had hoped for a bit of a rest. Well, the rest is over, and Container 4 is now in the process of being filled.

Continued thanks to Barrie Cooper for enabling us to 'park the next beast' on his farm while it is being filled. With around 40% so far in situ and tightly packed, we are extremely grateful to Peter Symonds College (Winchester), Test Valley School (Stockbridge), The Springhead Trust (Fontmell Magna), and Hampshire Police Constabulary for donating a large number of very good quality, used items of classroom/office furniture and classroom resources. Our gratitude extends to many individuals who have also donated items.

We are pleased to report that Moses Kopa and his colleagues are thrilled with what has been donated so far. We keep them updated as this acts as a huge source of encouragement.

Treasurer Peter McAughey writes:

Here we go again. An opportunity to don your walking boots once more and challenge yourself, your friends and family to walk as far as you can for a wonderful cause. It's the annual Future Pillars Sponsored Walk being held in and around Woolacombe in picturesque North Devon on Saturday 20th June 2020.

We have had two walks so far: The Saints Way in July 2018 and the Isle of Purbeck Round in June 2019. Did you know our walks have raised £36,000 for the vulnerable children in Kabwe? Or that this year we achieved what may be a world first of a simultaneous walk across continents? Over 500 children and adults walked around Kabwe this June and they raised funds there as well.

So next June there will be another simultaneous walk (I made that word up but it seems to work!) and I can't wait. If you are wanting to walk in North Devon, then the booking form will be coming out before the New Year. It will explain the various options but in essence the morning walks will be either 14 or 9 miles approximately. A lovely lunch as ever. And then options of 13 easier miles in the afternoon for Hares and Tortoises (yes... they are back) or 5 miles as a slow recovery amble.

Pasty and pub options to complete what will be a memorable day. And you know that I book the weather in advance don't you...?
